

SEC General Election 2019 Asks

SEC believes the next Government must...

On funding:

- Fully fund the provision for children with SEND in early years settings, schools and colleges;
- Make real terms increases to high needs funding, school budgets and specialist Support services.

On Education Health and Care Plans:

- Ensure that all EHCPs meet the legal requirements, including input from health and social care services alongside education;
- Introduce a new national template to make plans easier to understand and improve transition between schools.

On SEN Support and staff skills:

- Provide better advice to schools on how to help children receiving SEN support;
- Audit and ring-fence all SEN funding to enable good quality SEN Support in all schools;
- Step up training and support for SEN specialist and support staff;
- Undertake a workforce review to enable all children and schools to be supported by fully trained specialist staff.

On rights and entitlement

- Ensure that schools are held accountable for all unlawful exclusions and offrolling;
- Give extra powers to Ofsted to investigate and fail schools who are found to have broken the law;
- Ensure that all children and young people have a right to a full and meaningful education;
- Ensure all schools comply with their legal duties to make reasonable adjustments so that children with SEND have access to a full inclusive curriculum and are not discriminated against by school behaviour policies.
